This year we were delighted to launch our very own, bespoke Outdoor Learning programme in Prep – 'Nature Explorers at Birkenhead School.'

The programme is aimed at ensuring pupils recognise the importance of caring for and spending time in the great outdoors. Children in Reception all the way to Year 4 enjoyed taking part in a variety of outdoor activities, building up a range of skills and experiences to help them understand and appreciate the outdoors.

In Reception, the children worked on their Acorn Level award, completing four activities including visiting Forest School and learning how to tie some knots with Sammy the Snake.

Year 1 completed their Young Sapling Level, making their own Stick people in Forest School, using Julia Donaldson's "The Stick Man" as inspiration, creating a minibeast hotel and toasting marshmallows around the campfire. Year 2 got stuck in at the allotment and undertook nature inspired art and den building to complete their Mighty Oak Level award.

Year 3 and Year 4 completed their Park Warden and Park Keeper levels respectively – visiting our allotment, carrying out experiments to see which conditions seeds grow best in, making bird feeders and much more. The children are all proud to have completed these first levels and we look forward to completing even more levels in the upcoming school year.




Hear from Sophie & Carrie, 4C

This year has been another great success for the Birkenhead School Civic Award, with a second level, the Eastham Award, being added to the introductory Mayer Award launched last year.

Children in Years 2 and 3 have been completing the Eastham Award, and we're delighted that every child who entered these two levels of the scheme was awarded the Mayer or Eastham Award in a ceremony with the Mayor of Wirral, Councillor Cherry Povall JP, on 21st May in Prep Hall.

The idea for creating the Birkenhead School Civic Award scheme came from the desire to continue the very successful scheme provided by Wirral Council, which was extremely popular with our children for many years. With the original scheme no longer running, Mrs. Ford wanted to do something to allow the children to explore and learn important fundamental skills to become good citizens.

The Birkenhead School Civic Award enables the School to celebrate the children's achievements both inside and outside of school, helping to shape them into well-rounded citizens who understand the importance of community, perseverance, self-reliance, and personal achievement.

The scheme is made up of five strands that the children have to complete, document, and have signed off by the appropriate bodies:

- 1. Local Awareness
- 2. Self-Reliance
- 3. Service to Others
- 4. Personal Achievement in Physical Activities
- 5. Wide Use of Leisure Time

The Award links with the School's Birkonian values of respect, responsibility, resilience, inclusivity, compassion, courage, humility, and integrity.

"Many of the areas overlap and are not exclusive to one particular element of both the Civic Award and our Birkonian values, but the fact that they intertwine so much helps helps to strengthen my belief that this scheme is an amazing initiative that matches the ethos of our school perfectly."

The Bombing of Birkenhead, 1940-41

On 23rd April, Ian Boumphrey gave a special lecture to Years 5 and 6, entitled "The Bombing of Birkenhead, 1940-41".

The children were shown slides of all the bomb sites across the Wirral and were intrigued to learn about the places that were hit. The German bombers were of course targeting the docks and Cammell Laird Shipyard but the bombs drifted off course. The bomb that landed nearest to the school was on the site of what is now the Caernarvon Castle Pub, on Bidston Road. Blast from this bomb took out the stone cross at the top of our School Chapel and four of its large stained glass windows too; miraculously, the School suffered no further damage.

lan was most impressed with the children's interest and attention. Those that answered his challenging questions were generously rewarded with a copy of his book, Birkenhead at War, 1939-45. It is always wonderful to welcome lan back to his old school and we are indebted to him for sharing his historical knowledge and his enthusiasm with our pupils





We were delighted to welcome children's author Anna James to the school in September. Anna is the author of the children's book series 'Pages & Co', which follows the magical, book-wandering adventures of Tilly.

Anna delivered an exciting and engaging talk, during which children in Years 5 and 6 enjoyed a journey around the world and created their own stories, much to their amusement. Anna spoke to the children about how she draws inspiration for her stories from her travels around the globe, sharing photos and interesting facts:

- Did you know that the Tikkurila Library has a karaoke booth installed?
- The smallest book, 'Old King Cole', measures just 1/25"x1/25" and can be found in the Library of Congress in Washington, US.
- The Osmothèque in Versailles, France, is the world's largest scent archive.

She encouraged the children to be like magpies and always be on the lookout for 'hidden stories', as they may be found anywhere and everywhere. Anna finished her talk by telling the children that "Imagination is Magic."

It was a truly uplifting and inspiring talk filled with laughter, and we would like to extend our thanks to Linghams Booksellers in Heswall for inviting Anna to the school.





Anthony Walker Foundation Talk

In class, the pupils researched critically endangered animals and created excellent information posters in groups before learning how to sketch gorillas. Rome in a Day for Year 3

Back in May, the children in Year 3 were studying the Romans in their History lessons.

To further their knowledge and to give them a practical flavour of what it might have been like to live in Roman times, Head of Classics in Seniors, Mrs Washington, came to visit their classes.

The resources came from the Cambridge Latin Course which is used in Seniors from Year 7 onwards.

With the help of student volunteers, teachers then demonstrated how to put on a toga, which is what Roman people would have worn. Often in Roman times, wealthy people would have had servants to dress them, so then the children took turns in being the master and the servant and

dressed up in togas themselves. The session finished with a "surprise dish". The Romans valued a healthy, well balance diet. Nevertheless, their menu would include surprising foods!

The year could best be described as a 'so near yet so far' season as defeats were experienced in no fewer than four semi-finals. These included the Year 6 Houlihan Cup Football, the Year 3/4 Corgi Cup Football, the Year 6 Girls' AJIS Football, and the Year 6 AJIS Cricket. Nevertheless, successes and highlights were achieved and included the following:

At the AJIS Cross Country Championship at Rossall School, postponed from October to May, Birkenhead School had two outstanding performances. Gabi won the Year 5 Girls' race, and Ben won the Year 6 Boys' race, both races with over 100 of the best runners from North West Independent Schools.

Athletics has played a key role in Prep Sport this year, from indoor athletics in the winter to outdoor athletics and Sports Day in the summer. In turn, this has brought a good degree of success in the various meetings that Birkenhead School participated in.

At the AJIS Indoor Athletic Championships in late January, held at Robin Park, Wigan, the school returned home with three gold medals, a silver medal, and two bronze medals, an excellent achievement considering the quality of the opposition. The highlight was probably gold for Oliver in the Year 6 One-Lap Sprint, although William first place in the Year 5 Chest Push and Lachlan first place in the Year 5 Javelin are worthy of mention. Following on from this event, Birkenhead took a team of Year 6 pupils to compete in the Wirral Schools Indoor Athletic meeting at Clare Mount Sports College.

After a successful evening, the school discovered that they had come first overall and were to represent the Wirral at the Merseyside Games at Greenbank Sports Academy in April. This was a far tougher event with 16 of the best schools from the area fiercely competing and, after an afternoon full of effort and application, Birkenhead came 5th overall.

In the final term of the year, attention turned to outdoor athletics and preparation for Sports Day. In addition, the school attended the AJIS Outdoor Athletics Championship at Victoria Park in Warrington. There was no overall team event, just individual events, and Birkenhead returned with five medals.

The Year 6 Boys 4 x 100m relay team won bronze, Mollie won bronze in the Year 5 Girls' Long Jump, Ben won silver in the Year 6 Boys 600m (lost out on gold by 0.2 seconds!), and two outstanding gold medals were won by Gabi in the Year 5 Girls Rounders Ball throw and by Barnaby in the 'blue riband' Year 6 Boys' 80m.

We'd like to thank Ella for coming and delivering such a wonderful masterclass.




Prep Football Tour



Thank you to everyone again and I can't wait for the next one!


Inspiring Talks Series

100 Years of Scouting in School

We made it! 20th Birkenhead (School) Scouts officially achieved our Centenary on 18th June 2024. After Baden-Powell launched Scouting at a meeting in the YMCA in January 1908, the Birkenhead pupils who attended came to the conclusion that it was a good idea, but it would not catch on.

We are happy to say that they were wrong. The Group was eventually formed, and went from strength to strength. Cub aged pupils in the Prep all followed a Cub programme every Wednesday afternoon whilst Mrs P Coggan was Head of Prep. Coming from a Girl Guiding background when I was interviewed by the then Group Scout Leader Freddie Wakelin to become a Cub Leader in 1988 I did not think I would still have the same enthusiasm for Scouting now, so many years later. Kelvin Britton our current Lead Volunteer (Group Scout Leader) arrived a couple of years earlier in 1986, already with Leader experience in Oxford, Bristol, Monmouth, Essex and his home City of Cardiff. Beavers joined our Group in 1990 and our latest addition has been Squirrels, for 4 to 6 year-olds, led by Mr J Davis and Miss S Lavelle. We are very pleased that we were the first Squirrel Drey in Birkenhead.

In a typical year our Scout Troop takes part in at least four competitions. The Beavan Challenge involves hiking an unfamiliar route, canoeing or kayaking, air-rifle shooting, archery and the Muddy Funster assault course. The Great Escape has 15 short bases involving problem solving and teamwork over a whole weekend. Challenge Camp is an opportunity to cook on an open fire, build a pioneering structure and hike the whole length of the Wirral Way. The Shelterbox Challenge which includes Cubs is a Treasure Hunt around the streets of Liverpool while supporting and promoting this charity.



Over the years we have enjoyed many other camps and adventures including District, County and National events. These have included trips to two Royal Tournaments in London, Wingding Camps for Cubs and Beavers, Welsh Jamborees and International camps in France and Poland. Many of our Scouts have represented Birkenhead at World Jamborees. We have been involved in Gang Shows locally, as well as performing in London and the Isle of Man. None of these things would be possible without the many Leaders and volunteer parents we have had help from over the years. We would like to thank everyone who has ever been involved. A big thank you must also go to all the parents who allowed us into their homes via Zoom during the Covid lockdowns. We sent the young people on treasure hunts around their homes and commandeered their kitchens in order to make microwaveable cakes in mugs.


Our funds also ensured that Natalia was able to participate in a wonderful school trip to Idyllic in Nairobi, a fun park with rides, a bouncy castle, a swimming pool and slides. Her animated face whilst on the mini-train ride shows just how much she enjoyed herself and it is heartening to know that something so simple as a day out can make such a difference. The funds raised also allow us to support key projects at Maria Immaculata School. The new Science Lab built at the school with previously raised funds, now needs

resources to ensure effective delivery of the curriculum, and we have agreed to provide the funding for these.

It has been a hugely challenging time in Nairobi this year and the torrential rains at Easter caused the worst flooding the region had seen in living memory. Natalia's home, a rooftop hut in the slums of North Nairobi, succumbed to the downpours and the family lost all their food and most of their processions. Change a Child's Life stepped in to provide a new roof for their hut, new mattresses, food aid and medication for Natalia's mother who had contracted pneumonia. This aid was literally life-saving. The Kenyan Government had declared a national emergency and had taken the decision to close all schools, so pupils were not able to return to school after the Easter holidays for another two weeks. Many schools took far longer to re-open due to flood damage, but Maria Immaculata School re-opened as soon as the Government permitted and, thankfully, Natalia was able to return to school where she has continued to thrive in her education. It is Natalia's ambition to become a teacher when she grows up. Her work ethic and her enthusiasm for learning are clearly evident and I have no doubt that, with ongoing support from Change a Child's Life, she will get there.

A big thank you for everyone's support for this important cause and here's to another fun year of fundraising in Prep!

An Exciting Community Course for Year 5 Pupils

This was our fourth year of running this exciting community course. 'Be Inspired' gives Year 5 children from primary schools across the Wirral new experiences and is designed to build confidence and help pupils prepare for secondary school.

Teachers and parents were invited to nominate children who would be invited to attend all four weekly sessions, during which they would get to try new subjects and activities, as well as building on the national curriculum supplementing the work done in primary schools. History

First World War Battlefields Tour

In June, a group of Year 10 and Sixth Form students travelled to France and Belgium. We set off from school shortly after 6 am on Friday, 21 June, and made the long trip to Dover to catch the ferry to Calais. Upon arriving at the Holiday Inn near Lille, we knew we had two days of visits to look forward to: day one on the Somme and day two in and around Ypres in Belgium.

On Saturday morning, after leaving the hotel, one of our group had the opportunity to visit a relative's grave Cambrin Military Cemetery. We then went to the trenches and memorial centre at Vimy Ridge, where we walked around the site, experiencing how close the two trench lines were to each other. At the memorial located on Vimy Ridge, we learned about different soldiers and other people who helped in the war effort including Old Birkonian, Geoffrey Haddock.

On our way to the Somme, we visited Neuville-Saint-Vaast German Cemetery, where nearly 45,000 Germans are buried. We proceeded to Beaumont Hamel Memorial Park, where the Newfoundland troops famously attacked the German lines, and ultimately 86% of these troops died, some before even getting to the front line, as bodies clogged up the British trenches from the first wave of the attack on 1 July 1916.

We also visited the famous Danger Tree, where Newfoundlanders sought shelter during the battle. Whilst there, we paid our respects to another Old Birkonian, J. M. Sykes, who died at 19 and had the School motto, Beati Mundo Corde, as his epitaph. We then went to Thiepval and the Schwaben Redoubt and placed a wreath at the Memorial to the Missing of the Somme. Next, we stopped at the Lochnagar Crater, where British mines blew up German positions, and then visited the Devonshire

Cemetery, where we saw the grave of the poet William Noel Hodgson and listened to his poem "Before Action". We also heard the tragic story of Captain Duncan Martin, who foretold his own death and tried to warn his superiors, to no avail, before the fateful offensive was due to begin.

On Sunday morning, we travelled to Belgium and visited sites around the Ypres area, including Hill 60, Tyne Cot, and the Passchendaele Memorial Museum. The museum was remarkably interesting; it had many artefacts used on the battlefield, including guns and artillery, and remodelled, replica versions of First World War trenches and dugouts. At Tyne Cot, the largest British and Commonwealth war graves cemetery in the world, we saw approximately 12,000 graves. Such was the brutality of the fighting during the Third Battle of Ypres in 1917 that 75% of these graves are 'known unto God' (unidentified bodies). It was a sobering place to visit.

Later, we visited Langemark, one of the few First World War German cemeteries, containing the remains of approximately 44,000 soldiers, including many in mass pits. We passed by Vancouver Corner, the scene of the first gas attack in April 1915. Later that afternoon, we travelled to Essex Farm Cemetery and learnt about famous soldiers such as the Canadian, John McCrae, a poet who wrote "In Flanders Fields".

That evening, we enjoyed a pizza at a restaurant in Ypres town centre after enjoying some time to do some souvenir (chocolate!) shopping. As a group, we attended the Last Post at the Menin Gate, where two of our Schoo party laid a wreath as a mark of respect for the fallen of the First World War

When we set off on the final day, we reflected on what we had experienced, the heart-breaking stories we had heard and we were sure that we had gained so much from such an emotive and action-packed trip to France and Belgium.













La Plagne Seniors Ski Trip

They were extremely grateful, and it was a lovely way for us to give back to a country that had given us so much over the past 12 days. The boys donated cricket equipment and clothing, adding a personal touch to our contribution. This was followed by a boat ride on the Madu River and a visit to a turtle hatchery, rounding off our journey with enriching experiences.

As we boarded our midnight flight back home via Doha, arriving in Manchester by midday on the 18th, we carried with us memories of camaraderie, adventure and cricket that would last a lifetime.

Many of these boys played 1st XV rugby during the season and matured into good senior players. 1st team cricket

As for the 1st XI, I have been incredibly pleased and proud with the effort and application this year. With the loss of some key players from last year, the team has rallied together, showing great togetherness and more fight than the previous year. Ben Baker has captained the side impressively and been integral to improving the team's culture. His gritty 32* off 80 balls against Bolton School to ensure we batted the full allocation of overs was evidence of him leading from the front.

We also had some early season successes, winning our group in the first round of the National Cup. Alongside this, the boys should be proud of their efforts against school cricket powerhouse, Sedbergh. We also showed similar levels of grit in our tour to London. Athletics

The athletic season of 2024 comprised the English Schools Cup for U15 and U13 age groups over two rounds. There were also early season track and field events at the Oval Bebington, and the season concluded with the Wirral Schools Championships for Years 7 to 9.

The Schools Cup is a team competition in which 14 or 12 athletes make up a team and score points for times and distances rather than places. Therefore, it involved a large number of pupils, many of whom were new to athletics. After a day of hard competition at the Oval, many athletes produced fine performances in very windy conditions. This meant our teams' scores were lower than the other regional scores, which had enjoyed some rare sunny summer weather in the previous week.

However, we were proud of their efforts and awaited the news of regional qualification. It was credible that we got two teams through to the North West B final at Ellesmere Port. How the Junior Girls did not progress was beyond me, as they performed so well on the day!

It was great to see the Junior Boys (Years 7 and 8) produce an excellent performance to come 2nd in the B final. Especially considering the team had to change on the morning of the event due to students' absence. Despite this, there were great performances all around, particularly from Nate Glascott-Tull in the 1500m, Tom Huxley in the 100m, and Joe Kurton in the 300m. This, along with a good all-round team effort, which included some positive Year 7 performances, helped to beat some strong Independent and Grammar Schools.

The Inter Girls finished joint fourth with some credible performances from a largely Year 9 team. This bodes well for the future. These included Scarlett Grundy winning the 800m and high jump, and

placings for Olanna Quinn and Sophia Woof in the 300m and Maisie Darlington Bullock in the shot put.

Nathanial Glascott-Tull deserves a mention for his qualification for the European Biathle Championships in Madeira and being selected for GB Pentathlon. He also did well during the fell running season as well as on the track in the summer. Meanwhile, Scarlett Grundy had a dream summer, qualifying for the English Schools Individual Championships in high jump and the pentathlon. She also won the Merseyside Schools Junior Girls high jump. Congratulations to both.

The season was capped for Scarlett Grundy winning the High Jump National U14 title at the English Schools in Birmingham in the summer holidays. The first ever national champion from Birkenhead School. An amazing achievement.

Overall, it was a good year with some positive team and individual performances as #TeamBirkenhead develops its athletics squads and training.

The Senior football squad completed eight fixtures this year, primarily against other schools' second teams. Sadly, we lost four fixtures in a month to waterlogged pitches; otherwise, we would have exceeded ten games in consecutive seasons. Although there are only a small number of regulars, other enthusiasts were 'borrowed' from the hockey and rugby squads, thanks to the flexibility of Mr Rule, Mr Pillow, and Mr Taylor.

Will Malpas and Fin Evmond were reliable performers in midfield, whilst Harvin Sandhu and Louis Hancock filled in where needed. When available, Sam Bannon's pace and versatility meant that he was effective in several different positions, giving the squad balance. Eoin Moore came in for the last few games, providing aerial dominance and calm assurance at centre-half. Others who played in several of the fixtures were Dillon Buckley and Year 11 students Zach Webster, Harvey Hibbert, Gabriel Mangan, Jake Smith, Fin Lawrence, and Adham Sabry. With no permanent goalkeeper, we relied on players to fill in, with Sam Bannon, Aly Maklad, Zach Webster, and Harvey Hibbert all performing creditably at various times. Strike of the year, however, came in the end-of-term House competition (won by outsiders Shrewsbury), with Dylan Carroll thundering in a volley from outside the box as part of a planned corner routine.

Although there is invariably a 'make-shift' element to each squad selection, the students have relished the competitive fixtures and derived a lot of enjoyment from them. Let's hope we can achieve a similar level of success next year.





Inspiring teaching and academic drive and a thirst to know more is alive and well at Birkenhead School.




Value Added – A 10 Year Trend

Student outcomes at Birkenhead School are exceptionally strong. All schools calculate the value that is added to each individual student by comparing GCSE results with baseline testing in Years 7 and 9. In the State sector, it is known as the Progress 8 score. You will see from the graph below that our figure has been between 0.3-0.6 for each of the last 10 years.

This shows that each student, on average, achieves around half a grade higher in each subject than their ability profile would predict; a great testament to the learning environment in School and the collective efforts and commitment of students, teachers and families.

We are extremely proud of this sustained success and this summary provides real reason for celebration for the whole School community.

As ever, a huge thank you to Mrs Cormack, Mr Ryan and Miss O'Connell for all their work and creative enthusiasm this year.


Amazing Artist Achievements 2024

As we reflect on the academic year, it's inspiring to see the growth and achievements of our students in the Design and Technology department. From Year 7 through to the Upper Sixth, our pupils have engaged in a variety of projects that not only enhanced their practical skills but also deepened their understanding of design principles, materials, and manufacturing processes. Here's a glimpse into the fantastic work accomplished across the year groups.

Year 7 students embarked on a journey of discovery and creativity, working on projects that introduced them to key concepts in design and manufacturing.



During the Michaelmas Term, they tackled the Chester Zoo project, where they designed and created puzzles for the zoo's gift shop. This project also highlighted important environmental issues such as deforestation and habitat depletion, teaching students how designers can minimise their environmental impact.

In the Lent Term, students ventured into the world of electronics with the 'Steady Hand' game project. They learned about electronic circuits and soldering components onto printed circuit boards, employing CAD/CAM technology to manufacture the game bases. The year concluded with a Textiles project in the Summer Term, where students designed and made zipped pouches, honing their skills in sewing and fabric manipulation.

Year 8 students built on their foundational knowledge with more complex projects.



They began with an electronic Night Light project, understanding light-sensitive circuits and their components. The Pewter Casting project introduced them to metals and alloys, where they designed moulds using CAD/CAM processes and cast pewter keyrings.

The Lent Term brought a Textiles project focused on creating 'bags for life' for chosen clients, emphasising sustainable design practices. In the Summer Term, students engaged in traditional workshop processes to manufacture scale models of Lego figures from pine, developing precision and craftsmanship.

Year 9 students faced more demanding projects that prepared them for GCSE-level work.




They began with a clock design project, refining their proposals through iterative design processes and employing resistant materials and CAD/CAM technology. The subsequent Textiles project involved

creating door stops from repurposed garments, integrating sustainability into their designs.

The year concluded with an Electronics project, where students designed and manufactured a stylophone, combining their knowledge of circuits with practical manufacturing skills.

In Year 10, students revisited and expanded their workshop skills through a mini-skills project.



They explored seating designs, conducting thorough research and analysis before producing prototype models. This iterative process encouraged creative and critical thinking.

The Summer Term introduced basic systems electronic circuits. Students used

Yenka software to simulate circuits and then built functioning circuits, applying theoretical knowledge to practical scenarios.

Year 11 students focused on their NEA contextual challenge, exploring various aspects of design technology, from ethics to material costs.



They developed innovative design proposals and manufactured complex final products, preparing for their final summer examinations. This rigorous process nurtured critical thinking, creativity,

and practical skills, aligning with the high standards of the GCSE curriculum.

Lower Sixth students in Product Design covered a wide range of theory topics and engaged in practical projects like designing and manufacturing an occasional table.



This project utilised CAD/ CAM processes and traditional cabinet-making skills, providing a solid foundation for their NEA projects in Upper Sixth.


In Electronics, Lower Sixth students delved into digital electronic theory, complex logic circuits, amplification, and programming. They created regulated power supplies and designed interface circuits using Assembler language.

Upper Sixth students built on this knowledge, covering advanced topics such as high-power switching systems and complex communications. Their major practical assessment involved designing intricate electronic systems, culminating in two comprehensive exams that tested their broad subject knowledge.

DT A Level Student Visit DMM factory

Our A Level Product Design students travelled to Llanberis to visit the DMM factory where climbing and arborial safety equipment is manufactured. The students undertook this visit to support their strong industrial foundation of learning and to witness, first hand, the many processes and testing strategies used in modern manufacturing.

Students were able to follow the process for manufacturing a carabiner from the raw stock form that enters the factory, all the way through the cutting, bending, forging, heat treatments, surface finishes and quality control and assurance best practice.

A Ghost Story at Christmas

We welcomed acclaimed author, Ramsey Campbell, for 'A Ghost Story at Christmas' as part of the School's Festival of Arts.

Ramsey and his wife, Jenny, listened to a range of superbly crafted stories. Ramsey has supported the School for a number of years, with the event being an annual fixture in the School's calendar. Students from Years 7 to Upper Sixth, along with guests from outside, shared the stories that they had written to the audience. At the end of the evening, Ramsey shared his insights into the writing process as well as his own role in the development of the literary horror genre before signing autographs and copies of his published work's.

There was also a selection of macabre art on display created by our Sixth Form art students. The artwork was inspired by fairy tales and was wonderfully surreal and dark which really set the mood.

Ramsey is an English horror fiction writer, editor and critic and since he first came to prominence in the mid-1960s, critics have cited Campbell as one of the leading writers in his field. He is an author of over 30 novels and numerous short stories, which have earned him critical acclaim and he is the winner of a number of literary awards. A collection of the students' work will be collated into an anthology and will be available for purchase in the Michaelmas term.

competition aimed at girls and young women across the UK, consisting of five challenging problems. Bonnie, Mim and Holly achieved Merits in the competition!





All of our Sixth Form mathematicians took part in the UKMT Senior Mathematical

Challenge. Many of them won silver or bronze certificates for their efforts and our gold certificate winners were Luca, Max, Dillon and Caiden.



Max qualified for the British Mathematical Olympiad in which he gained a Merit, Dillon and Luca won Merits in the Senior Kangaroo.



Now it was the turn of our Year 11 and Year 10 students to take part in the UKMT Intermediate Mathematical Challenge. Gold certificate winners were Prem, Michelle, John, Adam, Olivia and Luca plus Adham and Storm who were not available for the

photograph. Luca went on to win a Distinction and a bronze medal in the follow on round, the Maclaurin Olympiad.

Over the February half term break, all students in school were able to enter the Maths Education on Merseyside and Liverpool Maths Society Challenge competitions. There are three of these; one for Years 7 and 8, one for Years 9 and 10 and one for Years 11 and Sixth Form. Prize winners in these competitions were Ellana in Year 7 and Max in Upper Sixth.





A group of Year 11 and Lower Sixth mathematicians went to the Storyhouse Theatre in Chester for a morning of Maths Inspiration! This is a national programme of interactive maths lecture shows for teenagers. They want to show 14-17 year

olds that there's far more to maths than taking exams. The four speakers were the host, Helen Pilcher, James Grime, who talked about Secrets of the Digital World, Katie Steckles on the Mathematics of Life and Colin Wright who entertained with Patterns, Predictions and Juggling! A very enjoyable morning and I am sure we will be attending future Maths Inspiration lectures.

Also in March, a team of four Sixth Form mathematicians went to Liverpool John Moores University to take part in the Liverpool Mathematical Society Maths Pop Quiz! They performed really well and came eighth out of 43 teams.

A team of four Year 10 students went to the Maths Feast competition at St Mary's Catholic College in Wallasey. They had an enjoyable time tackling a range of mathematical problems and won one of the rounds.





Now it was the chance for Year 8 and a few Year 7 students to shine. They took part in the UKMT Junior Mathematical Challenge. Again, many students won bronze and silver certificates and the gold certificate winners were Nathaniel and Felix who also

qualified for the Junior Kangaroo and Gene whose score won him a place in the Junior Olympiad.

The UKMT Team Challenge and Senior Team Challenge both stopped during the pandemic and at last we have heard that the Team Challenge will start again next year so we look forward to entering a team early in 2025. Watch out for the return of the Senior Team Challenge too.







GEOGRAPHY

This year, the Geography Department organised two immersive field trips that offered students invaluable, hands-on learning experiences. These trips not only brought classroom lessons to life but also allowed students to engage deeply with real-world geographical studies. Here's a look at the exciting journeys undertaken by our Year 10 and Lower Sixth students.

Year 10: A Spring Adventure in North Wales

Just before Easter, 50 eager Year 10 students set off for a three-day field trip to North Wales, a key component of their GCSE Geography course. Staying in the historic town of Conwy, the students explored various geographical topics through a series of focused studies. The first day saw students visiting the picturesque Aber Falls, where they conducted an in-depth river study. They measured aspects such as river velocity, discharge, and sediment size, gaining practical insights into fluvial processes and river dynamics. On the second day, the group travelled to Llanberis to conduct a regeneration study. This village, known for its scenic beauty and industrial heritage, provided a perfect case study. Students examined the impact of regeneration efforts on the local economy, environment and community, offering them a nuanced view of urban regeneration and sustainable development. The final day focused on a flooding survey in Llanrwst, a town that has faced significant flooding challenges. Students assessed the causes, effects, and management strategies related to flooding in the area.

Religious Education

This year saw the successful introduction of two new courses in RE. In Year 9, we introduced a study of non-religious worldviews by looking at Humanism.

This encourages students to investigate, among other things, how non-religious people make ethical decisions and how and why they celebrate major life events.

We also introduced a new course at A Level with the start of Philosophy of Religion in Lower Sixth. This enables students to explore topics such as the different arguments attempting to prove the existence of God and the problem of evil and suffering for religious worldviews that believe in a good God.

We continue to examine the beliefs and practices of major worldviews such as Christianity, Judaism, Hinduism, Buddhism, and Islam, as well as ethical issues such as human rights and social justice, crime and punishment, and peace and conflict.

Earlier this year, the RE department took some Year 11 students to Liverpool for the European Youth Parliament Regional debating competition. They were a credit to the

School, worked incredibly hard as a team all day, and won both their debates on feminism and town planning, and povertu and crime.

A selection of Year 7 RE students also took part in a litter pick to enable them to put into practice their work on environmental issues and help a local community. We hope to roll this out further next uear.



European Youth Parliament Regional competition

On the 28th February, six Year 11 students attended Liverpool John Moores University for the European Youth Parliament Regional competition.

In the world of EYP, Brexit never happened, and we are all united and tasked as committees to find solutions to contemporary issues facing Europe as a whole. The issues under debate this year included youth crime, marine biodiversity, Al and feminist town planning.

Our students were an absolute credit to the School and even teachers from other schools said so. They had clearly done all the research needed, had practised their speeches and were prepared to adapt them as necessary and they behaved politely and respectfully at all times, even when the competition got quite heated.

They each gained confidence as the day progressed, buoyed up by success after their initial debate, in which they won the public vote after being made to oppose a very attractive motion on increasing funding for youth services to cut youth crime. I have to say my heart sank when I saw we had been given that a few weeks ago! They very carefully opposed the motion on a number of technical issues, while agreeing with the substantive theme and successfully offered positive and constructive alternatives.

They worked so hard all day. It was nail-biting at times, but they won both their own debates and contributed thoughtfully in each of the others. I couldn't have been more proud of them. It's worth noting that most of the students had never been in a debating competition before and had limited experience of public speaking outside School. However, nobody would have guessed that. They each pushed themselves to do their very best and behaved exceptionally well throughout. The teamwork was evident and critical to their success.

Also worth noting that the Birkenhead School students were Year 11 and all the rest were Lower Sixth, which they clearly found intimidating when they first walked in...but not for long!

The trip was a wonderful opportunity for our Sixth Form students who were all keen to get stuck into analysing their data and writing up the investigation over their next few lessons!









Regenerative Medicine Visit

This year, Birkenhead School's Science Club, led by Miss Lightfoot and Dr Wilson, has seen an exciting journey filled with experiments, investigations, and a lot of hands-on learning for its enthusiastic Year 7, 8, and 9 students.


Led by Science Leaders Rebecca Wright, Erin McCausland, and Fareeda Nuru, the club took part in a national competition through All About STEM. Their final project focused on advances in food research, specifically avocado farming, with a submission poster showcasing their findings.

Closer to home, the students tackled a pressing issue: the failing privet plants outside the Science building. After conducting a thorough investigation, they determined the cause was poor drainage, leaving the plants waterlogged. Since their intervention, the plants have thrived, proving their hypothesis correct.

In addition to these larger projects, the club explored smaller-scale investigations, ranging from herb propagation and bubble snake surface tension experiments to engineering challenges like bridge-building. The students also got creative with slime, bath bombs, copper sulphate crystals, and even fireworks, delving into the chemistry behind their vibrant colours.

One of the year's highlights was the club's recreation of an A&E scenario, where students simulated an emergency abscess removal using surgical PPE. This followed last year's crowd-favourite "brain surgery" practical and was met with just as much excitement, sparking requests to share the experience on the school's Science Twitter page. Birkenhead School's Science Club continues to inspire curiosity and innovation among its students, proving once again that learning can be both fun and impactful.





Our Engineering Advanced Tutorial Group Students Get an Inside Look at Engineering and Nuclear Industries

Lower Sixth students enjoyed a unique opportunity to explore career paths in engineering and nuclear industries through several industry visits. The handson experiences provided valuable insights into potential future careers.

The students were first welcomed by NSG Environmental Ltd, a leading nuclear engineering consultancy based in Chorley. During their visit, they were given a guided tour of the site and had the chance to trial cutting-edge tools, including an advanced Geiger counter. The students also engaged in a discussion about the diverse career opportunities within the nuclear sector.

In another visit, the students had the privilege of touring the AMF Precision Engineering buildings. Former student, Zack Kirkman, who is now a part of the company, led the tour, giving them a comprehensive overview of the site and its operations.

A particular highlight for the group was towards the end of the summer term with a visit to Airbus. They were given an exclusive tour of Airbus's North factory, where the iconic wings for the Airbus A350 planes are manufactured. The students interacted with apprentices and graduates who offered valuable career advice, especially for those considering future roles in the aerospace sector.

These visits have provided the students with a practical understanding of the engineering world, offering an exciting glimpse into their potential future careers.

Brain Day

Before the Christmas break, we welcomed Dr Sutton back to the School to talk to our Sixth Form Biology and Psychology students for Brain Day.

The first part of the day was aimed at Upper Sixth Biology students. Dr Sutton began by enhancing our understanding of nerve cell communication with an in-depth look at synaptic transmission. We were introduced to certain disorders that can occur during brain development due to the absence of genes or the inability of the brain to fully separate into two hemispheres. Dr Sutton then explained what makes the human brain distinctive from other species. This was followed by a sheep brain dissection to examine key structures and compare its neuroanatomy.

Afterwards, Dr Sutton provided insight into recent developments in neuroscience, including the use of brain organoids to mimic neurological diseases for better understanding. Other future prospects were discussed, such as brain-computer interfacing, neural decoding, and neurobionics. Daunting but exciting possibilities were considered, including downloadable memories and thought-controlled computers. In the afternoon, Upper Sixth Psychology students reinforced their knowledge of schizophrenia and explored its link to crime. It was discussed whether having neurological disorders removes the ability to

control existing thoughts or causes a change in behaviour. As a result, questions were raised about the extent to which we have free will. Controversial law cases were examined, including the case of Paul Crossley, to consider whether criminals could be rightly blamed for their actions.

This complemented our classroom learning on forensic psychology and issues and debates around free will and determinism. The concept of neuroplasticity — where neural pathways in the brain change through growth and reorganisation — was also referenced in relation to gender, the brain's method of coping with trauma, and buffering the symptoms of neurodegenerative diseases like dementia.

Overall, it was a captivating day that offered great insight into the world of neuroscience and was a helpful contribution to our A Level studies.



Rocket Team Success at UKROC Regional Final

Our rocket team, comprising Year 11 and Lower Sixth students, recently travelled to York for the regional UKROC final.

With plenty of rocketeers and experienced teams from other organisations, they were fully immersed in the process.

It was a fantastic day, with both flights successfully launching and returning to school. They are now eager to enter again next year, possibly with two teams... watch this space!






A level Chemistry visit to University of Liverpool

In March, our A level Chemistry students paid a visit to the University of Liverpool for a day of spectroscopy, spectrometry and organic synthesis.

The students used NMR, GC, and IR to confirm that they had synthesised benzocaine. A wonderfully insightful trip enjoyed by all.





Psychology

In 2024, the decision was made to change the Psychology course specification from AQA to Eduqas to provide a broader and more rigorous academic study of the subject.

Leading universities highlight that the Eduqas examination board is the only one at A Level that fully prepares students for higher education by requiring them to carry out two personal investigations and answer questions on them in the examination. Students create hypotheses, gather participants using various sampling techniques, consider ethical implications, and conduct a full statistical analysis to check for significance.

For the first personal investigation, students hypothesised that sleeping patterns are affected by age. This research offers insights into strategies for managing and treating sleeping disorders. They created an online Google Forms questionnaire and distributed it to over 80 people using volunteer sampling. Learning how to create professional questionnaires and understanding the benefits of this method for reaching a diverse range of participants was invaluable for the students' research skills.

During the School Open Day in April, Lower Sixth students conducted their second personal investigation. They asked attendees aged 6 to 59 years old if they would be willing to participate in an investigation on age and reaction times. Students used the Stroop Test to test their hypothesis that 'As age increases, the time taken to complete the Stroop Test will also increase,' a prediction collectively made based on previous research. They used opportunity sampling to approach participants, set up their own equipment, recorded data, and analysed the results to confirm that statistically, they could accept their alternative hypothesis.

Engaging in such investigations was invaluable for students, providing them with insights into the research process used by psychologists they have studied and highlighting the time-consuming and complex nature of research.

This level of preparation and experience ensures that Psychology students excel at the start of a Psychology degree, where research is an essential part of the course.

Psychology students have many opportunities to explore the subject outside the classroom. During 'Brain Day,' Psychology and Biology students work together to learn about the inner workings of the brain. The Psychology side of the conference explores brain anatomy, methods of studying the brain, from open brain surgery to neuroimaging, and neuroplasticity: the effects of smartphones and vaping on the brain. Students also learn about the dissected brain, the effects of hemispherectomy, and have the opportunity to conduct a sheep brain dissection to experience first-hand what the brain looks like and how the theoretical functions they learn about in the classroom appear in real terms. Finally, students apply brain research to areas of the specification they are examined on, such as schizophrenia, drugs and the brain, and the challenges of mentally ill offenders and the law.

Students also visit Shrewsbury Prison to experience the history of crime and punishment, learn about the role of the media in sentencing, explore how a jury works, and consider the various roles within a prison, including guards, prisoners, and management, as well as how the prison fits into the UK judicial system as a whole.

Our Futures Team has been busy delivering a bespoke skills programme designed to prepare Sixth Form students for Higher Education and the world of work.

Through the programme, students participate in a range of engaging and interactive workshops and seminars offering valuable opportunities to develop their wider reading and research skills, as well as providing them with interview practice and tailored preparation for the various tests required for certain courses.

Sessions have included a carousel of skills courses, which is aimed specifically at developing interview, presentation, research and critical thinking skills. For those students that have needed interview practice in advance of university entry, they have been able to benefit from the School's extensive list of external contacts to be

able to put into practice and hone those skills developed in the Futures Programme in as realistic a context as possible.

The Advanced Tutorial groups have also been meeting regularly, and students have been encouraged to lead discussions on a range of current and thought-provoking topics. The groups consist of those applying to medical courses, including veterinary medicine and dentistry; those applying to study other courses at toptier universities, including Oxbridge; and one for prospective Engineers. Sessions cover the intricacies of the application process, preparation for admissions tests and interviews, understanding the college system at Oxford and Cambridge and making effective use of open days. Students Those whose courses will contain a heavy mathematical component are given extra support to prepare them for interviews, assessments, and STEP examinations where required.

Futures Fair

On Monday 4th March our Futures Team held a 'Futures Fair' as part of National Careers Week, bringing together students and professionals from a wide range of fields.

Students were given the opportunity to meet employers and explore different career paths speaking to professionals in the fields of Gastroenterology, Forensic Psychology and Dentistry, to name a few. It was a fantastic opportunity for students to ask questions, network and browse the different stands to see if any matched their career aspirations. Our exhibitors commented on the confidence and genuine interest from our students and we are so glad many relished the opportunity – some as young as Year 7!

We were pleased to welcome some of our Old Birkonians as exhibitors for the event from companies including Rathbones, NSPCC, NHS, Progressive Energy and Lloyd's Register. We are also indebted to our parental and community support who represented DWF Law, Slater and Gordon, PFP Wealth, Legat Owen, plus many others.

As part of the fair there were also workshops on apprenticeships information, as well as demonstrations on our choices, careers and application support online programme, Unifrog. We would like to thank all the professionals who offered their time and advice, we are very grateful for their expertise and support of Birkenhead School students.

Apprenticeship Breakfast


Our annual Apprenticeship Breakfast event is growing in popularity amongst students at Birkenhead School, as many look to prepare for their futures.

Nicholls Lecture: Dr Paula Cowan

At the start of term our Sixth Form welcomed Dr Paula Cowan MBChB, the Northwest Regional Medical Director of Primary Care. Throughout the lecture, Dr Cowan gave an insight into the 'Poor Law' and life before the NHS was founded in 1948 and even the first heart transplant on the NHS in 1968. The lecture then followed onto how Dr Cowan's career now mainly evolves around preventative care. Dr Cowan was inspirational in describing her somewhat lengthy journey to her current job, including qualifying from the Royal College of Surgeons, Dublin and practicing in Internal Medicine, Critical Care and Anaesthesia within Ireland.

Dr Cowan also spoke about a vital aspect of her career: listening to what patients aren't telling you and not what they are telling you, as well as some of the more challenging situations that are often presented in the healthcare profession. A diverse range of job roles in the NHS including Clinical lead for Urgent care at Wirral CCG although she mainly leads on women's health and respiratory medicine, Dr Cowan held the attention of the Sixth Form captive whilst she encouraged us to 'be chill like a duck' - to appear calm

on the surface whilst working hard or in this case, paddling hard, underneath.

We ended the lecture with questions from many intrigued Sixth Formers, including questions such as "How would you like to see the NHS in 25 year's time?" and "If you were to leave your current job role today, what lasting impact would you like to think you have had?", to which Dr Cowan answered with enthusiasm. The lecture followed with a lecture lunch, including aspirational medics and dentists having the opportunity to discuss diverse careers and opportunities in the medical field.

A Level Results 2024

This year, students celebrating record A Level results with a quarter of grades achieved were A* and 62% were awarded A^* -A.

GCSE Results 2024

August saw the publication of our GCSE results, with 21% of all grades awarded Grade 9 and our Added Value score showing that Birkenhead School adds, on average, over half a grade higher in every subject compared to their baseline expectations.

Headmaster, Paul Vicars, commented: 'We are exceptionally proud of all our students who collected their results, due reward for the dedicated efforts of staff, students and their families over the two-year GCSE course. The School's academic focus is aimed at delivering excellence for all, measured not only by many students achieving the very highest grades, but also strong Added Value scores, and we are delighted with both outcomes.'

21% of all grades were Grade 9, with 59% Grades 7-9. Over a fifth of students secured all their grades between Grades 7-9 while, quite remarkably, 5 students scored 10 or more Grade 9s – a very special achievement. This year's Added Value score, the closest equivalent to Progress 8, means the School continues the trend over the last decade of adding, on average, over half a grade higher in every subject for each student compared to their baseline expectations.

Mr Vicars continues: 'While very pleased with today's results, one of the great features of a Birkenhead School education is that academic study is just one part of our provision. Today's students have immersed themselves in the cocurricular activities offered by the School; participation in sport, music, drama, debating and a rich variety of other clubs and activities on offer are integral to the daily life of students, enhance their grade outcomes, and provide necessary balance and perspective. We celebrate today's cohort who have been great contributors to the School community over many years, many gaining regional and

national representative honours across many sporting and creative disciplines.

The majority of students receiving their GCSE grades now proceed into the School's Sixth Form. Reflecting the quality of GCSE results, and the School's outstanding A Level pedigree, September's Sixth Form will be the largest seen in the last decade. While approx. 140 students remains small by the standards of many local schools, the bespoke and focused support, both academic and pastoral, and the co-curricular and leadership opportunities that such a size enables, is a hallmark of a Birkenhead School education, and attractive to broad-minded and ambitious learners who join the School community from outside for their Sixth Form education.

In addition to the regular academic curriculum, these students will enjoy a range of further opportunities designed to provide the launchpad and mind-set for success after school. These include the Beyond the Curriculum programme (BTC) which provides students with core skills including critical thinking, presentation, research and interview skills, bespoke Oxbridge, medical and engineering pathway preparation and support from the dedicated Futures Team regarding UCAS and top degree apprenticeship opportunities.

As role models within a School that starts in the Nursery, Sixth Formers have opportunities to volunteer, mentor and lead their community. It is an exciting place to further their academic and wider passions, develop lifelong friendships, skills and independence of thought, and gain access to a global network of Old Birkonians who are keen to help recent leavers and university students at the start of their careers.

Throughout the event, there were some very close finishes with every team member having to make a significant contribution at critical moments.

This is the fourth Old Birkonian win since 2011 – a significant achievement against the resources of some very large schools – some of whom run golf scholarship programmes and even have their own on-site golf courses.






Human Being published work

The First Hundred Years of 20th Birkenhead Scouts

Everyone who has ever given a public talk knows how things can conspire to ruin the best of preparation; late arrival and failure of audio-visual equipment can ruin everything. So it was in the old YMCA hall in Birkenhead on 24th January 1908. Nevertheless, Robert Baden-Powell persevered, and during his talk announced that he would be inaugurating an organised Boy Scout movement from that date.

It was taken up by two groups within the town, and although the 1st Birkenhead has long since folded, the 2nd has maintained its claim to be the oldest Scout Group in the entire world. There were boys from Birkenhead School in the audience, but they did not feel equally inspired to become involved.

Time passed; Scouting spread around the country, the Empire and indeed the wider world. Other schools similar to Birkenhead had embedded Scouting in the curriculum, and the then Headmaster, R Kennard Davis, had heard good things from other Headmasters. He approached a Master and Old Boy, W E Woodhouse, who had actually been present at the 1908 meeting to attend a Conference of Public Schoolmasters interested in Scouting at Easter 1924. Woodhouse was readily converted there and then, recruiting 13 boys to be the nucleus of the Troop, which was registered as 20th Birkenhead at Imperial Headquarters on 18th June 1924. Within a year, the Troop was established in Overdale, and assisted by pupils already active in other Troops within the town had grown to four Patrols, won a District Handicraft Competition and held its first Summer Camp near Holywell. The growth continued apace, with 81 in the Troop by Summer 1926! This led to a reorganisation into 3 Troops; the others were designated as 27th and 35th in 1928, renumbered as 37th and 38th in 1929, and then registered as part of 20th in 1935.

With the Third World Jamboree being held at Arrowe Park in 1929, it was natural that the School Troop was represented, with 14 members being part of either the West Cheshire or Public School Contingents. Many of the subsequent World Jamborees have been graced by Scouts from 20th, including in Hungary, Chile, Thailand and South Korea. Other International visits have included the biennial trips to Crouay in Freddie Wakelin's time, and more recent trips to Poland when Polish Partners helped to reintegrate the Polish ZHP into World Scouting following the collapse of the Berlin Wall.

In the early days, the School (and indeed the Scout Movement) concentrated on the Scout age group, but over time, opportunities for older pupils to take leadership responsibilities as Senior or Rover Scouts developed.

Eventually, shortly before the outbreak of WWII, a Wolf Cub Pack was started in Prep, and Cubs have been an everpopular activity from then on. Over time, the Association has changed in many ways, and we have adapted accordingly. A Squirrel Drey and a Beaver Colony have been founded and continue to flourish, Wolf Cubs became Cub Scouts, the age range for Scouts was modified, to be followed firstly by Venture Scouts as part of 20th, but now by Explorer Scouts run at District level. All sections can and do accept girls as well as boys, and the Scout Promise has various options to cater for those with no faith as well as those with commitment.

Being a School Group has unique opportunities and challenges; at various times, sections have had meeting slots within the school day, but there are obvious tensions when trying to balance that with the key principle that membership of Scouting is fully voluntary. Latterly, all section meetings have moved out of time-tabled time; our meetings directly after School work well for our Young People, but less well when it comes to recruiting adult help! Thanks so much to all our supporters over the past century who have helped the Group in whatever capacity; we could not do what we do without you all. Thanks particularly to those who preceded me; the last 38 years have been great fun and I intend to keep going as long as I have something to offer!











Herr Walther Bensemann



The Archives Department received a query from Dr Gillmeister of Bonn University about Herr Walther Bensemann's time at BS where he was a language teacher from 1911 to 1914.

It transpired that Herr Bensemann is considered to be the pioneer of German

soccer, a sport he became passionately interested in during his time at a private school in Montreux, Switzerland. When he moved to Karlsruhe, to take his school leaver's examinations, he began to spread the game around Germany. In September 1889, he founded the International Football Club, the first football club in southern Germany, and two years later he was instrumental in the founding of Karlsruhe FV, one of the first champion clubs in Germany. He was also involved in the creation of Frankfurter Kickers, who would later become Eintracht Frankfurt. In 1900 he belonged to the founding-fathers of the German Football Association. Bensemann thought of football as a means of international understanding, so he started to organise international matches such as the ones between Lausanne and southern Germany in 1893. This led on to the five historical matches between Germany and England between 1899 and 1901.

Bensemann even put up the £200 required for the project (his father was a Jewish banker in Berlin). England won the first two games 13-2 and 10-2, which caused a Berlin newspaper to write: "After the first game the improved defeat in the second was because the Britons were most affected by the ceremonial drinking sessions and the spree following, which spoiled their fitness. The third game was won 8-0 and the fourth 7-0. England has since carried on this downward trend, with few exceptions." Although these matches had no official status, they are considered historically as the first international matches of any German side. While teaching at the School, Herr Bensemann was well known for his lavish dinner parties given for influential and prospective parents at the renowned French restaurant in the Adelphi Hotel, Liverpool. He went on holiday to Germany in August 1914 and did not return. Why, one wonders, did such a wealthy man teach in Birkenhead? Could it be its close proximity to the major port of Liverpool in which he spent some time – especially in its main hotel where secrets could be overheard? According to The Birkonian, after he left, some thought he had been a spy. In 1920, Bensemann founded Germany's Kicker-Sportmagazin, which soon evolved to be Germany's leading football magazine, a status which it retains until today. In January 1933, the Nazi Machtergreifung (meaning "seizure of power", it is specifically used to refer to the granting of governmental powers to the Nazi Party in Germany) compelled Benseman to move back to Montreux where he died soon after, relatively unnoticed and without

Andrew (Sandy) Irvine was born in Birkenhead 1902. His father William Ferguson Irvine OB 1880-4, sent him to Birkenhead Prep in 1910 (between 1878 and 1926 there were 18 Irvine's from the same family at Birkenhead School).

In 1916 he left for his final

two years at Shrewsbury School, entering Merton College Oxford in 1921. He attained a Double Rowing Blue and one for Squash. He went on the British Arctic Expedition in

for Squash. He went on the British Arctic Expedition in Spitsbergen in 1923 and in 1924 was a member of the third British Everest Expedition where on 8 June 1924 he and George Mallory died near the summit of Everest. George Mallory's body was discovered in 1999 but no camera was found to prove that the two men had conquered Everest. Sandy Irvine's body has never been recovered but if it is, the camera might also be found. Julie Summers, his great niece, unveiled his portrait in Bushell Hall in 2001, she also published his biography "Fearless on Everest – The Quest for Sandy Irvine". Julie recently unveiled a Blue Plaque outside his former home, 56, Park Road South Birkenhead, to commemorate the centenary.

Obituary: Sheila Brew

We are sorry to record the death, last December, of Sheila Brew. Sheila was involved for many years in a variety of roles in School.

She was laboratory technician in the Physics and Biology Departments, assuming that role just before GCSE changed the way all subjects were taught. Over the years, she was involved in a variety of other roles: the provision of match teas, the work of the Ladies' Committee, uniform sales, the organisation of the November Bazaar and the robing of the choristers on Sundays in Chapel, of which she was a keen supporter. Her stall in the bazaar, over which she presided under its banner 'Mrs Brew – good as new' was a very popular feature of proceedings.

Her son, Iain, was a pupil at School from 1979 to 1986, after which he read Medicine at Sheffield University. Sheila was rightly proud of his achievements as a doctor over many years.

Obituary: Dennis Highcock

We are very sorry to record the death, in March, of former teacher Dennis Highcock, after a short illness. Dennis was appointed to the staff in 1997, joining the Physics Department. On the retirement, in 2000, of Alan Hanson, he was promoted to the post of Head of Department, which he held until he retired in 2012.

Dennis was educated at Cowley School, St Helens, and at the University of Bangor. He was in post when important changes were made to the examination system with the introduction of AS and A2.

Dennis was a popular figure among colleagues and students alike. Not least of his attributes was a very attractive sense of humour, which enabled him establish an atmosphere of harmony in the Physics Department. Former students will remember him with respect and affection.

Obituary: Bob Birrell

Members of Staff and Old Birkonians associated with School during the second half of the 20th Century were very sad to hear that Bob died just before Easter after being ill for some time. He taught hundreds of pupils over many years and will be remembered with great respect by all who knew him.

He was educated at Barrow Grammar School and the University of Manchester, where he was awarded First Class Honours in Chemistry. He was appointed to the Staff by Headmaster K D Robinson in 1962 and promoted to the post of Head of Department in 1969, which he held until he retired in 1998. He taught mainly what would now be Years 9 to Upper Sixth, which involved him in contact with many examination candidates over the years. He was a Housemaster and fully involved in the running of Public Examinations; he was a loyal supporter of Chapel and School Concerts as well as devoting much time to coaching rugby and athletics, for which latter role he was particularly suited, having represented his country as a younger man in both the Commonwealth and Olympic Games in 1958 and 1960.

Nobody had a bad word to say about Bob. His sharp sense of humour was appreciated by all his colleagues; he managed to amuse and delight without ever causing offence. After his funeral, a service of thanksgiving was held in School Chapel, attended by a large number of those whose lives he had touched during his own long life.

Obituary: David Boyce

David was born in Bebington, Wirral on February 19th, 1945. He attended Birkenhead School from 1956 to 1963 and while at School, became a founder member and drummer for The Roadrunners, a popular and influential R&B band, based on the Wirral.



Debuting at The Cavern Club in February 1963 on the same bill as The Beatles, the band went on to enjoy a further 70 plus appearances during the early sixties, by which time David had left School and turned professional.

After leaving the band in the late sixties, David turned to acting, and trained at the Rose Bruford College from '69 to '72.

Since then, he enjoyed a successful career as a journeyman character actor, and appeared in more than a hundred stage plays. He also worked on dozens of films, TV plays and series, as well as commercials in the UK, Europe, and the USA.

David sadly passed away on 1st May 2024 at the age of 79.

2013-14 Jerry Grundy replaced Headmaster



1983-84

School Boarding House closed, final Housemaster being Ray Liddell. Choral Society performed Purcell, King Arthur/Vivaldi, Gloria. Des Bower retired for the second time after 38

1973-74

19 pupils awarded places at Oxford and Cambridge. 'K' Block opened by Sir James Mountford. Jim McGrath OB awarded a second Cambridge football blue. Mike Croker OB represented Great Britain at handball. The following retired: Jock Austin OB after 28 years teaching Maths, History and Geography, also Cricket and Rugby; Ernest Camier after 28 years teaching Maths. Number 30 Picton Close was bought by the OB Society, as accommodation for the Head Groundsman and family.

2003-04

John Clark appointed Headmaster having been appointed Deputy Headmaster in 1996. The 50th Anniversary of the Christmas Bazaar (see article). School Rugby 1st XV toured South Africa, they won 4 out of 5 matches. The following retired: Mary Williams after 24 years, the last eight as Headmaster's Secretary; Ian McKay after 24 years teaching Maths, also sailing and CCF-Royal Navy; Jane Laxton, 14 years as Librarian; Eric McKevitt 15 years teaching Music and Nick Clark, 12 years PE, History and coaching Hockey. Numbers: Big School 483 (149 Sixth Form) Prep 266

1993-94

Stephen Smith appointed Deputy Headmaster. New School Hall named Bushell Hall, after previous Headmaster Mr WF Bushell 1930-46. Commander

appointed Executive Officer of the Royal Yacht Britannia. Roger Ewing OB received English Badminton award for long-standing exceptional service. Jeremy Eyre retired after 13 years as Prep Deputy Head. Numbers: 681 (205 Sixth Form) Prep 381

1963-64

Mr JA Gwilliam, a former Welsh Rugby Captain, appointed Headmaster, replacing



Mr KD Robinson. He was a disciplinarian Headmaster, who was to lead the School for 25 uears.

John Rogers and Alan Martin OBs were selected for England Rugby trials. CCF Army camp was held at Holcombe Moor in Lancashire. RAF Camp was held at RAF Cranwell, where Group Captain Aiken OB was Commanding Officer. The new Scout Hut was opened at McAllester Field. The School Philatelic Society was resurrected. Brothers JR and MF Crocker were selected as Captains of Cheshire Schools Senior and Junior Cricket Teams respectively. Mrs DB Hubbard retired after teaching 13 years at the Prep. Numbers: 639 (224 Sixth Form).

Years Past

1953-54

Rev RA Homan appointed School Chaplain, taking over from Rev 'Chuck' McVicar OB; following his death his house, 46 Bidston Road, was left to the School. Oak panelling was introduced in the Dining Hall, financed by Old Birkonians and Parents, with donors' names inscribed on the panels. The Big School stage was enlarged and improved, to allow more adventurous and dramatic productions.

1933-34

The first 'Old Boys' Day' was held at School, with 150 OBs present. Cricket matches and shooting competitions versus the School were held. Miss Cox died, having served 43 years as the first Prep Headmistress. Herr Bensemann died, a former language Master 1911-14 (see article). About 180 seats for Big School were engraved with donors' names. Hockey was re-introduced in the Lent Term. Numbers: 269 (42 Sixth Form) Prep 97

1913-14

The new Chapel west window was unveiled in memory of Rev JT Pearse, the School's first Headmaster. The School's Cadet Force was formed in October 1914, shortly after the outbreak of World War I with 120 boys aged 12 to 18. Herr Walther Bensemann, a language teacher from 1911, left August 1914 returning to his native Germany (see article). Numbers: Big School 210, Prep 73

1893-94

The School acquired the use of a large level playing field (before the School pitch was levelled in 1898) at the corner of Bidston and Howbeck Roads, which became part of Wirral Ladies' Golf Course. The name 'Birkonian' was coined in 1894. Previously the boys were known as 'Birkenheaders' or 'Birkenheadians'. The 1st Rugby XV were winners of the Liverpool Schools' Football (Rugby) Challenge Shield. School Sports Day was held in April at Birkenhead Park Rugby Club ground. The School Cricket XI were unbeaten with five teams being bowled out for less than 32 runs!

1873-74

The first School magazine was published with nine editions from March 1874 to June 1875 then restarted in 1883.

Numbers: 120

1943-44

Following the 1944 Education Act, the School held its own entrance exam. The local authority also established its own selection exam, later known as the 'Eleven Plus'. Teachers and 30 boys again helped with the War effort in the summer holidays at Sudlow Farm Knutsford. The boys slept under canvas with the leaders sleeping in the 'Ritz' and the 'Rank Inn' - converted hen-houses.

Numbers: 385 (59 Sixth Form) Numbers: 576 (149 Sixth Form).Prep 213

1923-24

Birkenhead Scout Troop was started with 13 boys using the basement of Overdale for their first two years. Andrew 'Sandy' Irvine OB 1910-16, was lost on Mount Everest, together with another local boy, George Mallory (see article). The School



Cadet Corps was officially recognised by the War Office as an Officer Training Corps (OTC).They received new rifles and bayonets. Their nine-day camp was held at Strensell in York. Harold M Locke OB played Rugby for England in its Centenary game. Numbers: 484 (Big School 334) Prep 150

1903-04

The Debating Society restarted after a five year's absence. One motion "Capital Punishment should be abolished" was defeated 12 to 16. Athletics Sports Day included: 120 yards; 220 yards had handicap; 150 yards and 300 yards sack race. The mile race only had three entries but the half mile had 68 entries!

Numbers: Big School 165 Prep 58

1883-84

Rev JT Pearse retired after 23 years as the first Headmaster. He chose the School motto Beati Mundo Corde (Blessed are the Pure in Heart), which was his best epitaph. The School magazine was revived and has been published every year since (School Archives have all copies of the publications). Numbers: Big School 104 (numbers declined in Rev Pearse's last five years but increased again with the new Headmasters)

1863-64

The earliest School printed list was in 1864 and shows the staff: Rev JT Pearse; Rev GH Hopkins; Rev GI Stephen; Monsieur Tueshi and RG Kelly.
